We are concerned that he has not yet been authorized to visit the DPRK. We urge North Korean authorities to allow Dr. Muntarbhorn and all other relevant Special Rapporteurs, including the Special Rapporteur on Torture, free and unlimited access to the country's population.
- Canada is deeply concerned by reports of internment, torture, and execution of North Koreans who have been repatriated from abroad. What specific steps can the international community take to ensure the safety and security of North Korean refugees?
